IV. Rationale for Establishing the Network:

In the past years, all applicants have shared a drive and passion to build positive school-climates for Dutch children, teachers & parents. SWPBS has given each separate organization involved important tools, necessary to work toward achieving this. In order to strengthen the foundations of SWPBS in the Netherlands, it is now necessary to join forces and find ways to work together efficiently, in order to achieve a variety of goals (see V). Creating a Dutch SWPBS network is an opportunity to take SWPBS in the Netherlands to the next level. Even though

there is no funding, working together will enable us to improve and monitor the quality of implementation of SWPBS in the Netherlands and to translate state of the art knowledge to daily practice at a greater scale and with more ease.

V. Projected Goals and Activities of the Network

The goals of the APBS network are stated below:

- 1) An APBS Network is established (name has been decided upon: SWPBS Nederland).
- 2) The SWPBS Centers in the Netherlands with partners are visible Expertisecentrum PBS Windesheim, Kenniscentrum SWPBS Nederland, Fontys, PicaPedia, Yorneo, PBSing.
- 3) SWPBS partners are identified.
- 4) The 5 Pillars of SWPBS are reformulated in a publication written by all members of the leadership team.
- 5) Establish a communication plan (overview of schools and coaches).
- 6) Knowledge of SWPBS is widespread in the country (like HGW).
- 7) Establish a common certification for schools.
- 8) Build awareness of knowledge that learning and behavior (MTSS) are interconnected.
- 9) Identify types of outcome data to collect from schools.
- 10) Develop videos of PBS implementation of model schools.
- 11) Develop professional qualification standards.
- 12) Identify and explore related research projects.
- 13) Develop better support for PBS-coaches.
- 14) Well-developed curricula for PBS professionals: Coaches, Leaders, Data, Team, Team Chairs, Parents, Youth care (systems of care/family support systems), Preschool, Afterschool, Specialists, Evaluation.
- 15) Complete an evaluation study on PBS results: Primary schools, bullying, social climate, secondary schools.
- 16) Initializing a statewide evaluation plan with strong focus on fidelity and quality aspects in implementation.
- 17) Get external funding from public or private sector.

1) What is the purpose of your APBS network?

We are a group of organizations implementing SWPBS in the Netherlands. We aim to work together respectfully and transparently in order to:

- connect people, organizations and other relevant parties that are involved or interested in SWPBS.
- build structures in the Netherlands to facilitate implementation.
- promote high fidelity of implementation of SWPBS in schools.
- work together in connecting and communicating with the government.

Collaboration of 5 different organizations across the Netherlands, that were all part of the group that initially introduced SWPBS in the Netherlands (2009). Each organization is represented in a leadership team called the 'SWPBS Team NL'. Three organizations are structured as centers that focus on developing and spreading support & knowledge building around SWPBS across the Netherlands. We have identified 3 leading contacts, one from each center. The SWPBS team NL establishes nation-wide goals on development, implementation and fidelity-measures, and monitors the progress on the annual action plan.

- 4) How is your network funded? Currently there is no funding.
